Seasons Greetings, One and All!

Another year has come and gone and been filled with exciting decisions, amazing adventures, and exhilarating and exhausting fun! Please read along and share our year with us.

December held many fun and intriguing activities. Piper is beginning to come out more and more with her singing in church. The preschool choirs really entertained us all with beautiful music and fun things to do. The preschool also went all out - not only with the singing, but by allowing the four year old class to present the nativity play. The Thursday after Christmas, Dr. Moses, my surgeon, operated and removed my gall bladder. Not my most favorite way to spend the holidays; however, now that the healing has taken place, I feel so much better. It was a difficult process, though. Whoever said that laparoscopic surgery was the "easy" way to go and that you "bounce right back" is not telling the whole story.



About 1 week into my recovery, I received a call from USC, asking if I could teach one of their classes – Artificial Intelligence. This is an area in which I am interested and have read, but never taught before. Dr. Matthews told me that the class would begin in a week. So, with 1 week's notice and 2 weeks after surgery, I started teaching a Monday/Wednesday/Friday class. Carrie Shelling and I took the children off to Riverbanks Zoo during their annual "Free Friday's" in the January/February time span. Her son, David, was born about 2.5 months after Amber. 



After a thorough review, we decided that, if we could manage it, we'd love to send her to Hammond. Their program sounded amazing. A lot of individualized attention, computer skills, Spanish, art, music, and nature skills - it was just incredible. However, Hammond is all

the way across town - it's about a 40 minute drive. Lee and I decided the benefits outweighed the travel and we decided to send her to Hammond. We got one of the last two slots and we were



We had a wonderful trip to the beach this year. Again, as usual, we went on the








More tests showed that the polyp had to be removed, as it was malignant. Dr. Moses did the surgery (he saw both of us in one year!) and he did a wonderful job. All of the polyp was removed and Daddy has recovered nicely from his surgery. We thank the Lord for the good news that things were caught early.

Mrs. Duffy, Mrs. Gore, Mrs. Belk, and Mrs. Cruea take over in the afternoon (everything else was the 9-12 schedule!). She breaks up her afternoons three times a week with Gymnastics, Science class, and Cheerleading. (I was told after the first couple of weeks that everyone took cheerleading but her and she really wanted to go. Heard that one before, anyone?)

At the end of last year, MOPS had meant so much to me that I volunteered to be on the steering team and head up the crafts. So, over the summer, I looked into many different ideas and we have 6 to 8 crafts planned for the upcoming year. I hope everyone enjoys them! Our first few meetings have gone well and everyone seems to really enjoy coming, listening to the speakers, and just talking and getting to know each other.





Last Spring, the preschool gained a new director (who, sadly, had to leave for health reasons shortly thereafter).
