Dear Family and Friends,



ribbons, she held her breath: 6, 5, 4... then, with only 3 riders left in the show pen, number 3 was called - and it wasn't her.







She knew she had one of the Nationals slots and was so excited! She finished second in her class and progressed on to Nationals, representing herself and her team in Lexington, KY. This is a difficult sport, as she was simultaneously elated for herself and so sad for her friends that did not get to go. She showed well in Kentucky and we got to explore the famous horse park with friends and team mates. She was also "caught being good" by IEA folks twice, winning a backpack and a subscription to Equine journal! So proud of her spirit and her heart for others.





Amber went on to ride with Hammond at the SCISA state championships, where Hammond took first place, earning her first belt buckle. She placed second in her first ride as a "Future Novice," her new class, and she was so pumped, excited, and happy.















Also, through the year, Amber got to enjoy going to cotillion - learning all the rules of etiquette and even some dance moves. Their two annual balls, the Holly Ball and the Spring Ball, were big hits for her and she loved all the pretty dresses and shoes that attending the monthly events brought.

Toward the end of the school year, Amber got to enjoy her 6th grade trip; it had been postponed with the previous year's flood taking precedence, and all the Hammond 6th graders headed first to the Atlanta Aquarium and then on to Space Camp in Alabama. Amber had a blast!

Amber vowed that this past summer, slated to be the "best summer ever" she was going to work really hard to hone her riding skills while helping at church, going on preplanned trips, and having













so much fun with her friends. Alas, all her plans came to a crashing halt one June afternoon when she was grooming her horse, Coosa, and he kicked out at a horse fly, hitting her in the leg, right at the growth plate in the knee. It moved the growth plate, fractured the femur, and left Amber in intense pain like she'd never known before. Piper, Cody, Mrs. Joy, and I were by her side quickly, Mrs. Joy wrapping the leg so tightly so that it wouldn't budge; Lee met me at Doctor's Care



in record time; surgery was 5 days later to set the leg and growth plate and for 9 weeks, Amber could put no weight on her leg AT ALL. Throughout the summer, she had 5 different braces on her leg (they don't cast that type of injury) - from the wrap and two initial orthopedic braces to one from her thigh to her ankle with no movement, to one which allowed 10-30 degrees of movement. With braces on her teeth and having to sleep in a back brace, Amber has confessed she's tired of collecting braces.





My normally active child was frustrated to be relegated to the bed, but her friends and family rallied around her; some coming and playing board games or watching movies, others playing online games with her, others sending sweets and treats. While she loved visits from her friends, visiting the zoo in her wheelchair, cleaning tack, eating at Dempsey's pizza, enjoying church, catching Pok-e-mon, visiting Coosa (had to let him know she was okay), and finding out that the adult with

her wheelchair gets into the movies for free (so we found Dori several times...), she was frustrated that she missed visiting Pennsylvania for Aunt Jeanette's birthday celebration, helping with Vacation Bible School and Mrs. Joy's horse camp, attending an amazing horse clinic in NC, and part of the beach vacation, though she and I did get to go for part of my families trip at the end of the summer; Piper and Lee came up on the weekend of the trip (she was working hard this summer - see below) and Kim helped Amber start to put weight back on her leg and rebuild her strength in the condo's pool; she used crutches the rest of the time. She began walking without crutches about a week before school started back - so it was not really a fun





As soon as Dr. Piehl gave the "go ahead" she was back at the barn, and with Mrs. Joy's help, mounted Coosa for the first time since her accident. She knows she has a long way to go to rebuild the strength lost to atrophied muscles, but she was determined to ride for the team again this year and has been going to either physical therapy, conditioning, riding, or karate (she's back looking for her second-degree black belt with Mr. Jerry, too) - or some combination of two of those, every day since August while maintaining an excellent grade average. We ended the summer with a fun make over and Amber started off 7th grade strong, was recruited for the Duke TIPS program (so she'll be taking the SAT's in 7th grade!) and looks forward to a great year! She also had an amazing fall trip to Camp McCall with the youth group at church. She's catching up on all the fun and work she missed out on this summer, though she has also seen quite a few Hallmark movies now.





To help Amber (and save my sanity), we made a difficult decision to move our horses from Joy's barn, McMillion Farm, to Creekside Stables, which just happen to be located across the street from our home. Now that we've done it, I wonder why we didn't do it years ago, as the ability to ride every day without the 90-120-minute round trip to Hopkins has been such a blessing. However, we miss seeing our McMillion Farm barn family as often; we do still enjoy the lessons and clinics, as well as the shows that allow us to catch up with all our friends. Adrian

Mack, at Creekside has also introduced Amber and Piper to the world of Huntseat, and Coosa and Duke seem to like the use of an English saddle for half the time and a western saddle the other half of being ridden. The English saddle is a lot lighter than the traditional western tack. We really appreciate the warm welcome Adrian has given us and look forward to making more and more new friends there. Meanwhile, Piper has had an amazing year of many firsts that come once-in-a-lifetime. She, too, made her points at Zones, coming in first in her class, and went on to compete at the Kentucky horse park. She placed third in her class

at Nationals her first year of high school! Both

girls were surrounded by their loving family and we were all so proud of them!



Piper later attended an amazing horse clinic. There, she and Duke learned from some of the best horse professionals in the country. The riders who attended were from up and down the east coast and traveled to Laurinburg, NC at the St. Andrews Equestrian Center to learn from the best: Sandra Vaughn, Ryan Cottingim, Debra

Jones Wright, Carla Wennberg, and Keigh Miller. The kids spent three days soaking in the knowledge these amazing professionals agreed to share with

After finishing her freshman year of high school strongly, Piper began what she's labeled "the best summer of her life" (not counting the part where her sister got hurt). horse(s) and head for breakfast on her way to the zoo, then work from 8-4 and return home; on other days, she would start (8-4) at the zoo then leave for Chick-Fil-A to work a 5-9 shift. Oh, to have the energy of a teenager who loves what they're doing.







With her busy summer schedule, Piper didn't get to go to the beach as much as usual; instead, she came for a weekend and I finally got the picture I've been trying to get since her first trip at 3 months old: a picture of Piper with her "namesake" - a flock of sandpipers on the beach.



Working so hard enabled her to pay off her horse, so Duke is all hers. She loves that little reiner! She took some lessons from our new co-coach, Dennis Pope, and had a great time in Georgia. She started reining for the team and with three shows behind her, has her points for advancing to Zones - she's excited to start her IEA reining off with such success.







September brought Piper's "Sweet 16" birthday party. She loved helping plan it - she wanted a dinner with music from her playlist; an interesting mix of pop, dance, country, and Christian praise music - all so Piper! We rented out the Ascot clubhouse and hosted a nice party with a mix of teens from all parts of her life; long time "like-family"

friends, Hammond school friends, barn friends, church friends, Zoo Teen friends, working friends, and even a boyfriend -Levi. Lee and I felt so honored and happy that Piper has chosen such a wonderful group of friends. All of them were well mannered, enjoyed the food and the photo booth, and were very polite, with a few being able to stay and help clean up.



Piper had spent all of her savings on her horse, Duke, so Lee and I decided to do what we had said we would not and give her a vehicle for her 16th birthday. With the help of Aaron Turnage of Turnage Motor Co., Piper's dreams came true with a big red Toyota Tundra truck on the eve of her birthday. It was so much fun to surprise her (with the caveat that this was a birthday and Christmas and every other holiday for a while gift). We've added the towing package so that one day she can haul her "baby" to shows. We just need the bumper
