2018 has been an exciting year, full of victories and challenges, goals being met, and upcoming concerns. We hope you enjoy this letter as we share our year with you.



April also brought the IEA Huntseat National Finals. Our friend and fellow Creekside teammate, Susannah Johnson, had made it as an individual and we eagerly watched online and cheered for her as she rode her class. She took it all the way - Susannah is the National Champion Future Intermediate Huntseat Flat rider this year! We are so proud of her and it couldn't have happened to a sweeter child and family. Of course, our barn family had to get together to celebrate - gathering at San Jose with a cake for congratulations. Way to go!





April brought the next AQHA and ARHA shows as well, but since the ranch show conflicted with prom, Piper elected not to attend that one. I was surprised that she wanted a longer gown, as Piper normally likes the shorter dresses, but it was perfect for her. My sweet girl looked just like Cinderella and the best part of all?!? Unfortunately, April also brought a sad parting of the ways. Over the last three years, many decisions made by their western coach were difficult to understand and not in the girls' best interest. We tried to stay, out of loyalty to her and to the school, as she is the Hammond coach; however, after one final and very upsetting conversation, we told her that we would complete the season, but would not be returning to ride with her and her barn. It was a difficult, but we felt necessary, decision for our family to move on. As Amber prepared for IEA Regionals, things were a tense. Piper had decided to stay home from Regionals (so she said...) so I left her with her grandparents as Lee and I took Amber to Alabama to compete for her individual place as well as the place with the Hammond Middle School Team. In this sport, one can compete both as an individual and together with a team. Amber has worked her way to the intermediate position, meaning she should ride twice for her team - in horsemanship and reining. However, her coach had told us that she would not be allowed to ride for reining, which was Amber's favorite.



Once we arrived in Alabama, we were told that Amber was allowed to ride for the team in both positions. Unknown to us, Adrian (Amber's Hunt Seat coach) had worked with Piper and secretly brought the hunt seat team as a surprise! This meant a 6 hour drive for them, a hotel, and lots of planning to give her support. They arrived on Friday night in secret and showed up at the arena early Saturday morning with posters and banners to watch Amber ride! I can't tell you how much it meant to our family to see Adrian, Kelly (team mom) and all the middle school and some of the high school come to show their support! It was an amazing show of love and and one we will never forget. Amber's individual ride was amazing, earning her individual spot at Semifinals. The team rides went well also - in fact, if Amber had not ridden in both positions,

the team would not have advanced; however, with a fourth in horsemanship and a second in reining for Amber, a fourth for Millie's horsemanship, and a second for Marci's horsemanship rides, these three little girls showed all the bigger teams what they were made of and earned their slot at Semifinals as a team. Each of them also earned their slots as individual riders. I was so proud of all of them. They were heading to Tennessee in May to compete for a very difficult slot to move on to Nationals in Oklahoma.













As May entered, Lee's Run for God race came and he did so well. I'm so proud of him - he's now running with the 10K group. We also enjoyed Mother's Day with family and friends as well as a celebration of several May birthdays. Piper was awarded the Columbia College Scholar award and Amber placed in the 84th percentile nationally on her Spanish exam. We are so blessed to have two intelligent girls! Amber received her official badge as a ZooTeen and was looking forward to beginning in July. She was also told that she was to be many honors classes as she entered high school. Piper chose an ambitious schedule herself, with almost all AP's her senior year. No slacking off for these two!



Amber was also busily preparing for semifinals with the Pope's at Flamekissed Farm - practicing and riding all she could. We so appreciate them for putting the fun back into riding for both my girls. 
Amber and Piper won so many tickets. Lee and I also had to contribute to the
