She was down over the loss; and I love to make Christmas special.

As a surprise, I got up REALLY early with Mama and Daddy and we did the craziest thing we went to Disney for the day! Yep - within a 24 hour timespan we traveled from Columbia to Orlando and back. I'd called down and the very kind folks at the Grand Floridian resort were holding three wallets to choose from. We arrived

around noon and enjoyed all the Christmas decorations of the Grand Floridian. Then, we hopped onto the Monorail and visited the Contemporary and Polynesian! It's so beautiful at Christmas there.













I was able to find some delicious treats for both girls, too. Then, we drove over to the Beach and Yacht Club to see the beautiful chocolate and gingerbread carousel and miniature village before hitting the road back home. Her face when she opened it made it all worthwhile! A couple of months later, to our surprise, her friend Eliana found the original wallet - it had fallen during a visit behind a piece of furniture. It was such a relief to find it.

Of course, the biggest event of last December was Amber's surgery. We had prayed that she would not have to have it, but that was not God's plan. In the days leading up to the surgery, she worked to do all the things she knew she wouldn't be able to do for a while. This included her two sporting activities - karate and horseback riding. Amber had seen to her baby, Fancy, and friend McKinney was to lease her, giving McKinney a horse to ride and Fancy exercise. She also talked to each of her teachers about taking her exams early. All but one agreed so she took four exams in the week before her scheduled surgery - and found out after Christmas she aced all of them! We were so proud of her.



The morning of the surgery 12/17, we got to the hospital before 6am and they took her back quickly. We were so blessed to have family and friends throughout the day to sit with us, pray with us, and check on us. Around 6:00pm, Dr. Piehl told us everything had been successfully completed! I went back to recovery to stay with her but had not eaten all day. So, I passed out. (Mom fail.) Lee came to stay with Amber while Piper and my cousin Kim met me in the ER as they gave me fluids for about half an hour before they let me get back to her. Mama and Daddy had already left to take care of our dogs but returned quickly when they heard about me! About 2am that

morning (Lee and I stayed in the room with Amber) she was wired and

talking to me - and she said "Mom, did you pass out?" She remembered! The scariest thing to her was that she couldn't see when she first woke up in recovery - no one had told her that there would be a film put over her eyes to keep them moist during surgery. She was afraid her vision had been affected and we were all relieved to find out it wasn't.









The next few days in the hospital taught us to manage pain. Within a day, Amber was up and walking - and 2 INCHES TALLER! I was amazed how quickly she went from sitting up in the bed to sitting on the edge to walking in the room to walking down the hall to walking around the hall! The nurses at Palmetto Children's Hospital are awesome - looking out for her and guiding her and















pushing just enough. Since we were there right before Christmas, the hospital also had us go down and choose a massive amount of gifts, including t-shirts, games, a live (and decorated) Christmas tree, which they then wrapped and packaged up for Amber to enjoy when she got home. So unexpected! Amber also enjoyed looking at the ceiling tiles, hand-painted by other patients and especially loved the one of Dobby (from Harry Potter) dressed in a hospital gown holding a hospital sock.

She had us take her picture on her release and captioned it "Amber is a free patient!" (She's a big Harry Potter fan!) All the visits from family and friends meant so very much both in the hospital and when we got back home. We so appreciate the prayers and support and can't thank you enough.





We got home from the hospital on 12/22 and could not travel for Christmas this

our barn friends. We took it day by day, but she was intent that she wanted to get back to normal as soon as possible.













When school started in January, Amber was back on the first day, complete with her rolling backpack. Picking up too much weight was strictly forbidden. She started with a half-day, then went the entire day and never looked back. Friends helped her if stairs were involved to get her backpack where it needed to go and with the new elevators in the renovated building, Hammond had everything she needed. She completed her 5th and final exam, did well, and started the spring semester without missing a beat.

January brought new adventures. Fynn discovered my exercise ball and

had a great time playing around with it. Another Hammond tradition is the "senior speech," so in January, Piper addressed the high school in assembly and did a great job. Meanwhile, Amber's art was so beautiful in the high school show.

February also brought IEA Regional finals for Creekside's Huntseat team. As a senior, IEA really treated Piper well - they invited all the seniors with their coaches to be recognized for their participation and accomplishments. She was presented with a very nice plate to remember her IEA competitive years by. Such a nice treat! Adrian Mack has been such a Godsend for our family - taking care of our horses and our girls with such grace and love.

Little Fynn also continued to grow - getting bigger and more of a "teenager" as we moved toward his 6 month birthday!





The beginning of March brought Riverland Hill's "Disciple Now" weekend and Amber and Piper both enjoyed a weekend filled with Biblical learning and friends. Amber couldn't participate in all the activities, but enjoyed it just the same.







Amber was allowed more freedom to try more activities - she could work on her karate movements, as long as she didn't apply force behind them, and she was happy to be back. Amber continued to ride; walking and

jogging and rebuilding. 

The talk about Piper made us so very proud as parents - not only recognized for her academic and equestrian ability, but mainly for how she displays her faith and values. She is such a strong, Christian young woman, mature beyond her years in many ways. We are so very proud of her. Listening to our video, I transcribed the comments read by Chris Angel about our firstborn:

What valuable lessons to share. Then, the senior class walked across the stage to receive their diplomas.














































Piper also attended her last meeting as a ZooTeen. She and Amber both got to handle the timireks, which are such adorable little creatures!

friends - the Girards! Dudley, Stella, and Vera Ann were back in SC, visiting old haunting grounds and old friends. We had a great




dinner together and really enjoyed catching up.





